Pet's Best Life, LLC. Aims to Help People 'Love Their Dogs Longer' with Science-Based Products like Yummy Combs(R) and Longevity15(R)

North Kansas City Mayor comments about KC Royals discussions

After many months of rumors, but no real information, North Kansas City Mayor Jesse Smith announced that the city is having substantial discussions about the possibility of the Kansas City Royals selecting North Kansas City as the location for a new stadium and surrounding economic district. The Royals have not yet made a decision on a location that is needed before expiration of their Jackson County Kauffman Stadium lease in 2031.

Mayor Smith said North Kansas City would communicate four primary community priorities to the Royals as talks proceed:

- 1. Any ballpark agreement must protect the city's long-term financial health, as "a true win-win" for residents, businesses and the team.
- 2. It must safeguard residential neighborhoods north of Armour Road from traffic and parking issues on game days, he said.
- 3. North Kansas City also would look to any Royals project to catalyze long-term infrastructure investments, including water and sewer upgrades outlined in city master plans and needed to accommodate a stadium complex

4. "Clear and open communication" with city and county stakeholders will be essential if a deal framework is reached.

North Kansas City Safe Streets for All (SS4A) Project

The City of North Kansas City received a Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation to develop a comprehensive safety action plan. With this grant, a clear, data-driven plan will be created to improve roadway safety for all users and eliminate traffic deaths and serious injuries in North Kansas City. To develop this plan, we'll take a close look at North Kansas City's crash data, contributing factors, road and traffic conditions, community input, and existing policies.

The North Kansas City Comprehensive Safety Action Plan will help identify strategies, policies, and solutions to eliminate roadway deaths and serious injuries. This could include changes to street designs, how funding is allocated, education efforts, and improving emergency response systems. The plan will also identify future projects and large safety programs that contribute to the goal of eliminating traffic fatalities and serious injuries. Once the plan is complete, North Kansas City will be eligible to apply for additional grant funding to implement the strategies it outlines - transforming the community's input and the plan's recommendations into real improvements. Your input will help shape a safer, more connected community for everyone. That's why community participation is so important - the strategies identified in this plan will directly impact your community and all those who live, work, and travel in North Kansas City.
