Possible Uses of Remaining \$922 Thousand in ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) Funding

# **EXPLICIT ELIGIBLE USES**

Support the COVID-19 public health and economic response by addressing COVID-19 and its impact on public health as well as addressing economic harms to households, small businesses, non-profits, impacted industries, and the public sector.


Provide premium pay for eligible workers performing essential work, offering additional support to those who have and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical sectors.

Invest in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure, making necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water, support vital wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and expand affordable access to broadband internet.

Replace lost public sector revenue, using this funding to provide government services up to the amount of revenue loss due to the pandemic.

- Retention Program for eligible workers performing essential work. A few cities have utilized these funds as one-time retention payouts, primarily for public safety, municipal services, water, and wastewater operations.
- If Council is interested, staff would recommend the retention program for represented employees. Non-represented employees were addressed in the recent compensation study.
- 93 represented employees (Police and Fire)
  - \$2,000 Retention Program \$186,000
  - \$3,000 Retention Program \$279,000
- · Must stay with City until end of year 2024.
- Neighborhood grant program. Residents submit ideas for infrastructure projects in their neighborhoods.
- Funding for unhoused programs and resources.
- Funding for utility assistance programs.
- Funding to expand LiNKCity access to existing multifamily units.






A suggestion from North Kansas City Hospital for use of these ARPA funds was mentioned but not discussed. A last minute document was made available to City Council members but was not displayed on the screen like other suggestions.

Conclusions: There seemed to be a lot of support for the retention program at the \$2,000 level and a preference among other options for "needs" over "wants".

#### **Agenda Items**


#### **KCATA Flex Route**

Approximately 82% of the total KCATA expense for North Kansas City is for the flex service.

Following is a description of the new IRIS flex service that will serve the entire Northland, not just North Kansas City. Will electric mini-van vehicles and will also offer handicap adapted vehicles.

### Phases

- · Phase 1: Northland
  - March 15<sup>th</sup>
- Phase 1b: NFL Draft
  - · Expand to cover Citywide during the draft
  - · Big marketing push
- Phase 2: Citywide Coverage
  - · Between May 1-July 1



## Iris Initial Service Area and Fare Structure

- · Phase 1: Northland
- Service Zones
  - · Cover all of Northland
  - Each zone connected to transit hub (bus symbols)
- · Fare Structure
  - Stop-to-stop in-zone: \$3
  - Stop-to-hub in-zone: \$0
  - · Zone-to-zone: \$4
  - Airport \$10
  - Can establish new fares as desired

# Moving Forward

- KCATA will present a 9-month contract on March 21.
- Both the missed trips reimbursement, and the service consumed model will be implemented.
- Service consumed ratios will be reviewed and adjusted on a yearly basis.
- IRIS will be implemented at a future date.

#### Water Damage to YMCA Gym Floor

Due to December25 frozen water line break the net result is that the entire floor needs to be replaced. Replacing wood floor is not likely to be feasible. Synthetic sports flooring is likely to be a better solution. This type of flooring is already in use at other YMCA locations as well as one of the program rooms. Replacing with wood would cost from \$800 thousand to a million dollars and would shut down use for 6-8 weeks. Synthetic flooring would cost approximately half that amount and installation would be much quicker. There is also a concern about availability of wood for flooring.

YMCA CEO Mark Hulett explained that all surfaces in YMCA's in the Kansas City area for the past 20+ years have been with synthetic flooring, not wood.

City Council consensus was to use the synthetic flooring option and to use insurance to cover as much as possible.
